Recommendation

Adopt the 2022 City of Wheatland Community and Economic Development Action Program as presented.

Background/Discussion

In 2019, the City Council adopted the first Community and Economic Development Action Program. The program was updated in 2020. Due to the COVID 19 Pandemic, the City Council did not conduct annual planning sessions in December 2020 or December 2021. As a result, the program was not updated at all in 2021.

The updates included in the draft 2022 plan are the result of removing completed projects from prior programs and including new projects that have been identified. The program's formatting has also changed to allow better tracking of target completion dates and progress.

Projects completed since adoption of the original program include:

- Installation of decorative safety fencing at Front Street Park between Main Street and Fourth Street.
- Completion of Employment Zone Feasibility Analysis for Johnson Rancho/Hop Farm annexation area. Funding provided by SACOG.
- Installation of Hooper Street Improvements fronting Wheatland Elementary School.
- Successful Passage of Measure O to extend our local ½ transaction tax for 10 years. The measure was supported by 80% of Wheatland's voters.
- Addition of online utility payment option to our city website.
- Completed modernization of outdated utility billing and accounting software. Funding provided by Yuba Water Agency and California Department of Water Resources (DWR).
- Launched City of Wheatland FB site and eNEWS.

New projects or updated projects included in the 2022 program include:

- Review lot size standards in the community.
- Develop plans to celebrate Wheatland's 2024 Sesquicentennial (150-year anniversary).
- Collaborate with Bishop's Pumpkin Farm to ease impacts and celebrate the connection to Wheatland's agricultural roots.
- Complete SACOG-funded zoning update
- Work to improve the inventory of property properly zoned for business investment and served by utilities, including land available for industrial and/or light manufacturing uses.
- Site UC/USAF research site in Wheatland.
- Seek opportunities to locate new, local sales and/or TOT producing businesses in Wheatland.
- Complete updated Drainage Master Plan with focus on joint-use park and drainage facilities where appropriate.
- Construct new signal at McDevitt/Highway 65.
- Complete General Plan update.
- Complete comprehensive zoning code update.
- Complete Prop-68 funded improvements at Spruce Park neighborhood park on McDevitt.
- Complete redesign of city website.

No comments were received on the draft presented on March 8. Once adopted, the program will be used to guide action throughout 2022 and beyond. The program is designed to be flexible and adaptable to changing conditions within the City. Staff will provide an update to Council on implementation in late summer and a final report near the end of the year.

This program does not qualify as a project under CEQA.

Vision

Wheatland adopted a vision with the General Plan in 2006. 16 years later that vision remains valid and useful for planning. The vision is as follows:

Wheatland is committed to be a forward-thinking city that values its small-town feel and its agricultural historical heritage. The Community Vision of the City of Wheatland is guided by the following:

1. *Wheatland's strong neighborhoods are the center of community identity.*
2. *Wheatland's historical city core is enlivened to ensure Wheatland has an identifiable sense of place.*
3. *Open spaces within Wheatland provide visual relief from urban spaces.*
4. *Wheatland's natural environment is continually improved through the regeneration of natural systems.*
5. *Wheatland is connected to the world while providing energy and economic opportunities locally.*
6. *Wheatland has many transportation options, including pedestrian, bicycle, public transit, private autos, and new transportation technologies as they become available.*
7. *Wheatland is not dependent on continued future growth to fund current city services, operations, or liabilities.*

Community and Economic Development Action Program

The *Wheatland Community and Economic Development Action Program (Action Program)* is designed to restate the General Plan vision, along with other identified priorities, as achievable action steps. The Action Program was developed first in 2019 and is maintained through annual planning sessions with the City Council and staff.

The *Action Program* is ambitious, and it is important not to expect accomplishment of all action steps within a single year. The *Action Program* is a living document, updated annually, to reflect accomplishments, new opportunities, and refined priorities. It is structured in two major areas of focus: improving the community; and improving the delivery of municipal services. No action step should be considered isolated as many steps are interrelated and dependent upon one another.
